These slaves were being sold at <u>Christiansburg</u>, Montgomery County (Virginia), which is southwest of today's town of Roanoke. The illustration is from *Sketchbook of Landscapes in the State of Virginia*, 1853-1867, by Lewis Miller. The Library of Congress contains graphic pictures and photographs of the buying and selling of African-American slaves:

• Arriving in South Carolina in the 1780s, a group of slaves are <u>slated</u> to be sold at Ashley Ferry (outside Charleston).

- Others including men, <u>women</u> and children are <u>auctioned off</u> as though they were farm implements.
- <u>Advertisements</u> highlight virtues of a particular slave.

• The chains America threw away when the colonies declared their independence from Great Britain <u>did not</u> <u>apply</u> to blacks. Some even attempted to argue that American slavery was <u>justified</u>.

- White buyers <u>inspect</u> a kidnapped African and negotiate a purchase price with African slave traders.
- Families were often split up. Here a mother pleads: "Buy us too."

• <u>In Alexandria</u>, Virginia captured Africans were held in "<u>slave pens</u>" as they waited to be sold while in Easton, Maryland many whites gathered for a <u>slave sale</u>.

Once slaves were purchased, how did they live? What kind of clothing did they wear? How much food were they allowed?
